Unit 2: 1607–1754

<u>British Colonial North America</u> Europeans and American Indians maneuvered and fought for dominance, control, and security in North America, and distinctive colonial and native societies emerged. *August 22/23 - September 14/15*

Unit 3: 1754–1800

A New Nation British imperial attempts to reassert control over its colonies and the colonial reaction to these attempts produced a new American republic, along with struggles over the new nation's social, political, and economic identity. September 14/15 - October 9

Unit 4: 1800–1848

Growth of the Republic & Antebellum

Reforms The new republic struggled to define and extend democratic ideals in the face of rapid economic, territorial, and demographic changes. *October 9 - October 31/November 1*

Unit 5: 1844–1877

Sectionalism, Civil War, & Reconstruction

As the nation expanded and its population grew, regional tensions, especially over slavery, led to a civil war — the course and aftermath of which transformed American society.

October 31/November 1 - December 5/6

Unit 6: 1865–1898

The Wild West, Populism, and The Gilded

Age The transformation of the United States from an agricultural to an increasingly industrialized and urbanized society brought about significant economic, political, diplomatic, social, environmental, and cultural changes.

December 5/6 - January 23/24

Unit 7: 1890–1945

Imperialism, Progressivism, Modernism, the Great Depression, and the Emergence of the US as a World Power (1890-1945)

An increasingly pluralistic United States faced profound domestic and global challenges, debated the proper degree of government activism, and sought to define its international role.

Unit 8: 1945–1980

The Cold War & Domestic Turmoil
World War II, the United States grappled with
prosperity and unfamiliar international responsibilities
while struggling to live up to its ideals.
